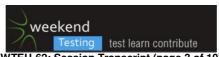

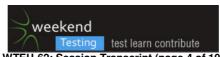

This is something we use in my office all the time; if we've got a particular project which involves people from multiple teams, we'll just create a new temporary "#project-name" group for the lifetime of the project.

[18/10/2015 16:05:33] Kirsty Selkirk: as a negative it looks like we would have to have paid accounts (unless we can contact slack and show we are not for profit and for education)

[18/10/2015 16:05:38] Weekend Testing Europe: Slack certainly seems a lot more seamless than Skype. From my experiences with Slack, it just naturally does what you'd expect it to do... most of the time.

[18/10/2015 16:06:15] Miranda Michalski: I think Slack is ideal for WT events since you can have channels devoted to each discussion and easily archive. That means joining the conversation will be easy and I refer back to it as well

We'd probably be OK to survive on the free account; the main restriction is that you can only search the previous 10,000 messages, but then we don't currently keep past sessions on Skype so that's not loss of functionality.

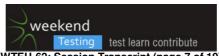

- + Adding people to a chat seems fast enough. Possibly even easier than Skype.
- + Pinning features seems useful for organizing WT stuff; No such option on skype.
- + notifications to people when mentioning their names seems useful for WT. No such option on skype.

General notes:

- + files/messages are private when shared in a private group.
- + files/messages sharing seems faster because the file only needs to be uploaded once.
- + archiving seems somewhat useful
- + forgot password feature seems ok (I can imagine people forgetting their passwords between sessions)
- + Private/public groups seem awesome for group work in WT sessions

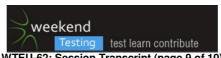
